

Harriet Tubman

(c. 1822–1913)

After escaping from slavery, Araminta Ross changed her name to Harriet Tubman, and became one of the most famous conductors on the Underground Railroad. She was an abolitionist and suffragist and lived for many years in the central New York village of Auburn, Cayuga County. She founded a nursing home there for elderly African-Americans.
