

# Vida Milholland (1888—1952)

Vida accompanied her older sister Inez on the 1916 campaign train to convince women voters in the western states to vote against Woodrow Wilson since, as the leader of his party, he refused to back the federal suffrage amendment. After Inez's death, Vida continued to work with Alice Paul and the National Woman's Party by singing at meetings and picketing the White House as a "Silent Sentinel", even going to jail. After the passage of the 19th Amendment, Vida worked for the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom with her partner Margaret 'Peg' Hamilton. She and Peg are buried near Inez in Lewis Cemetery, Essex County, NY.
