



Susan B. Anthony (1820–1906)

Born in Adams, MA to Daniel & Lucy Reed Anthony, Susan moved with her family to Battenville in my home town of Greenwich, Washington County, New York in 1826. Raised a Quaker, Susan was active in many causes including temperance, and the abolition of slavery. After meeting Elizabeth Cady Stanton she began speaking on women's rights. She would push for equal suffrage for women as the premier issue above all others until her death in 1906.

The 19th Amendment is often referred to as the Susan B. Anthony Amendment in her honor.
