

Inez Milholland Boissevain (1886—1916)

Inez was considered by many to be the beauty of the suffrage movement, but she had the brains to match. She graduated from Vassar College, and then earned a law degree from NYU. On a white steed, she led the 1913 Suffrage parade in Washington, DC. In 1916 she embarked on a grueling tour of the western states where women could vote, in an attempt to defeat the incumbent President Woodrow Wilson. Suffering from pernicious anemia, Inez collapsed after a speech in Los Angeles and died at just 30 years old, on November 25, 1916. Inez is buried in Lewis, Essex County, NY near her childhood summer home.
