

Lydid Dwelle Hodg (1835—1906)

was an active member of the Easton (NY) Political Equality Club for 15 years, joining at the club's second meeting October 24, 1891. Lydia kept a diary & in it she references suffrage meetings & rallies she attended. She died of typhoid in 1906, eleven years before she, as a New York resident, could vote.
