



Gertrude B. Ferguson (1871–1964)

was very active in her native Glens Falls community as Librarian, and later Director, at Crandall Free Library, a member of Study Club, Social Worker's Club, and Glens Falls Garden Club. In 1914 she was present at the official reformation of the Political Equality Club of Glens Falls, and was elected corresponding and recording secretary. Gertrude also represented the club at the 46th annual convention of the New York State Woman Suffrage Association in Rochester in 1914. She began working at Crandall Free Library (now Crandall Public Library) one year after it's founding & two years after graduating from Glens Falls High School. She worked there for 54 years, & served as Library Director from 1899-1923, 1928-32, & 1937-38.
