While in London in 1912, Alice, a native of Albany, NY, became involved in Emmeline Pankhurst's Women's Political Union and was jailed in the famous London Suffrage demonstration. Back stateside, she belonged to the New York State Woman Suffrage Party, and helped found the League of Women Voters of New York State. With all of this Suffrage activity, she still found time for avant-grade sculpture. Six of her works, including The Fist (1921), Trojan Women (1927), and an undated bust of Emmeline Pankhurst are in the sculpture collection at the Albany Institute of History and Art.
